## Narrative Description of Research, Teaching, and Service Interests

I am an interdisciplinary scholar working at the intersection of sociocultural anthropology, Latin American studies, and human geography. My research focuses on craft economies, cultural heritage, materiality, and food systems. My first book, *Between Art and Artifact: Archaeological Replicas and Cultural Production in Oaxaca, Mexico* (University of Texas Press 2012), is an ethnography of the historically contentious relationship between local artisans and statesponsored archaeology at Monte Alban, a UNESCO World Heritage site and popular tourist attraction. It examines the role of archaeological heritage and indigenous artisan production in the development of the post-revolutionary Mexican state, both as symbolic manifestations of a modern, national identity and as an economic resource for cultural tourism. I am the co-editor of *Edible Identities: Food as Cultural Heritage* (Routledge 2014), a volume that brings together top food studies scholars who explore the ways in which the cultivation, preparation, and consumption of food is used to create cultural heritage at multiple scales.

My latest book, *Oaxaca and Mezcal in the Twenty-First Century* Marketplace, is currently under review at the University of Texas Press. This work examines the sociologically complex field of production, marketing, and connoisseurship surrounding Oaxacan mezcal, a distilled spirit made from agave, which in recent years has been transformed into an economically valuable "craft spirit" destined for global export. My next book project, tentatively titled *Mexico by Design: From Handicraft to High Fashion*, is an exploration of Mexican fashion throughout the twenty-and twenty-first centuries; this project will examine the roles of indigenous textiles and design in the evolution of a distinctly Mexican style of fashion as well as the Mexican influences in the global design world.

My scholarly work has focused primarily on Mexico, but I have taught and developed curriculum touching on all areas of Latin America and the Caribbean. This includes core classes for undergraduate and graduate degrees in the Latin American Studies program, both of which introduce students to the interdisciplinary study of the region, in addition to courses in the Geography & Environmental Studies and Anthropology departments. I have also directed two field courses in Mexico for University of New Mexico students. My own academic formation in Latin American Studies provides me the disciplinary breadth and geographic depth necessary for comparative analysis and for drawing connections across disciplines in the humanities and social sciences. I served for six years as Director of Latin American Studies, a nationally recognized, interdisciplinary academic program offering BA, MA, and PhD degrees.

I have been President of the Society for Latin American and Caribbean Anthropology (a section of the American Anthropological Association) and have served on the editorial boards of the Journal of Latin American and Caribbean Anthropology and the Journal for Anthropological Research. In Mexico, I am a member of the executive board of the Welte Institute for Oaxacan Studies and have been a visiting researcher at the Centro de Investigación y Estudios Superiores en Antropología Social (CIESAS) in Oaxaca, Mexico. Most recently, I have served as Associate Chair of Geography & Environmental Studies as well as Acting Associate Director of UNM's International Studies Institute.
